THE WARSAW WAS -The recent expedition of Gov. Ford against the Anti-mormons has accomplished its object and the troops have been withdrawn. On the approach of the Governor's forces, several citizens of Warsaw went over the Mississippi to Churchville, Missouri, where they entrenched themselves in an encampment, as they were apprehensive that warrants were out for several of them, on suspicion of having participated in the Carthage

The Governor despatched a messenger with a flag of truce, officing a compromise. The conditions were, that if Mr. Shara, an editor from Warsaw, and a Col. Williams would surrender, they should be protected, not sent to Nauvoo, or tried in Hancock county; and that Jackson, for whom there was a warrant, might remain where he was, inasmuch as he was to ill to be removed. These conditions were accepted on the part of the billigerents. They therefore recrossed the river, and voluntarily surren- Estate of Col. John Jones, dec'd. dered; which concluded the armistice, and ended the war for the present. The Governor had in the mean time secured all the State arms in and about Warsaw, and the army was disbanded. These arrests and trials were thought essential by the Executive, to atone in some measure for the betraval of the plighted faith of the State in the massacre of the two Smiths at Carthage.

Gov. Dorn -- We were informed on Monday-says the Providence Herald-that this victim of Algerine oppression was suffering under a severe and aggravated attack of rheumatism, and that his friends had applied to the Committee who visit the prison, for such a relaxation of prison discipline, as might permit him to take such exercise in the open air, as the circumscribed limits of the walls of the yard would permit, and that the request was coldly and unfeelingly denied !

Bankruptcy.-Honorable Settlement .-In 1842, the Boston Courier, noticing with regret the extensive failure of a mercantile firm of that city, stated that their character for integrity and enterprise was a capital, which they could not lose and finally it would redeem them. The same paper now states that the assignees amount due by the firm in 1842 was \$850,000. The sales and collections have produced in each nearly \$800,000, and the active partner has added by his late carnings \$50,000, so that, after having obtained an honorable discharge from their creditors, every creditor has since received one hundred cents in a dollar in full payment of the debt due him.

TAIT, THE MCHOSERYR. SOON REWARD FOR RIS ARREST .- The Philadelphia Ledger says, a few days since we published an account of the murder of a young man, named Rives, at a wedding. Gov. Fitzpatrick, of Alabama, has offered a reward of \$400 for the arrest of Dr. Tait. the murderer, and Thomas Rives, Ksq., of Dallas County, a relative of the deceased, offers \$500 more, making \$900 in all. He is a physician by profession. The last account of him is, that he was travelling in the direction of the Mississippi.
