CURIOUS STATISTICS.—The American Institute of New York has published a statement respecting the consumption of animal food yearly in that city.

Assuming the population of New York city to be 350,000, and that the consumption of animal food averages four ounces per day to each, he total consumption in a year amounts to 31,375,000 lbs.—to which may be added the amount consumed by commerce in the coasting and foreign trade, and also by the population in the immediate vicinity of the city—13,472,500 lbs.—a moderate estimate; it makes up and confirms he total before stated, of 45,447,500 lbs., which at three cents per pound, amounts to \$1,363,750.

NEW YORK AND ERIE RAILROAD.—The prospect of obtaining the requisite amount of subscriptions is favorable. The New York papers say all the city directors, except one or two, have subscribed for the amounts which they propose to take, ranging from 30,000 dollars to 50,000 dollars, and those who have not yet put down their names, are ready to do so whenever it shall be necessary, in order to complete the um required.

THE MORMON CHARTER.—A bill has been introduced into the Illinois House of Representatives, repealing unconditionally the whole of the 'ormon charter, and referred to the Committee of the Judiciary by a vote of 108 yeas to 1 nays. voo of the four voting in the negative were Mormon representatives. The Springfield correspondent of the St. Louis Republican expresses ne opinion that the charter will be repealed.

THE NAVY.—The Navy and Seasons gives official notice that Elder Parley P. Pratt has been appointed by the Council of the Twelve to go to the city of New York, to take charge of the press in that city, to regulate and counsel the emigrants who come that way from Europe, and to take the Presidency of all the Eastern Mormon churches.

REFORMING CRIMINALS.—In Cincinnati, a chain gang is formed of criminals, and they are compelled to work on the public highway.

MAGNETIC TELEGRAPH.—It is said that the wires which were laid over the tops of the houses in this city, in the direction of Chatham street and East Broadway, have been extended as far as the shot tower, and will be continued to New Haven.—Jour. of Com.
