and the papers are filled with comments on this most extraordinary patriot and truly great man. In the eyes of Europeans, who, next to the inestimable traits of his character, are most struck by his military glory and genius, he is the most worthy champion of Washington; and the second saviour of his country. These views may perhaps correct the opinions of those in the United States, who have found fault with his political career, and as is but too much the case with partisans, underrated his vast real services to the country. There is no citizen in the United States who ought not to be proud of belonging to a country that has produced such a man. In an age of selfishness, materialism and religious unbelief he was an oasis in the deserton which the future historian, whether he belong to Europe or America, will dwell with pleasure and satisfaction. By the side of the pigmies To the Electors of Northumberland that nominally guide the fate of nations in Europe, General Jackson stood on a lofty eminence which was not reached by any of his cotemporaries. The Duke of Wellington is, perhaps, the only parallel he has in modern history; but the latter was the servant of the feudal aristocracy of Europe; Jackson was the champion of liberty in one of the darkest hours in the history of his country, and remained true to the faith of his early life till death called him hence. No man loved his country more than he did : none was more thoroughly impressed with its great mission; none labored so arduously in its cause. His rankest political adversaries will, in the end, be compelled to admit that he added much to her national renown, and that his diplomacy, successful in every part of the globe, has raised the respect paid throughout the world to the character of Americans. General Jackson, like all men of historical fame, believed in himself and in the prople on whose destiny he exercised such signal influence, and this faith was the talisman of his success. He defeated his antagonist. because he had more faith in the virtue of the people. His state papers were among the ablest of his time in any country, and all his private communications here the mark of frankness, manifess, and strong good sense. His letters on the annexation of Texas show a vigor of mind. a comprehensiveness of intellect, and a patriotic ardor scarcely equalled and certainly not surpassed by any statesman of the old world. His memory, when time shall have effaced the coloring of party and soothed the passions of men, will be cherished alike by all with affectionate picty.
