

We yesterday received a publication of Dr. Lyell's travels in the United States. We have since looked through his book, and find that it possesses considerable interest.

"One of the first peculiarities that must strike a foreigner in the United States is the deference paid universally to the sex, without regard to station. Women may travel alone here in stage coaches, steamboats, and railways, with less risk of encountering disagreeable behaviour, and of hearing coarse and unpleasant conversation, than in any country I have ever visited."

I am bound, however, to say that in the two most glaring instances of vulgar familiarity which we have experienced here, we found out that both the offenders had crossed the Atlantic only ten years before, and had risen rapidly from an humble station."

"The geologist, indeed, will find here no scenic description; for we suppose that to the thoroughly initiated, the mere scientific enumeration of soils and rocks will possess their minds at once with the features of the landscape: and who can say but that the time will come, when a knowledge of geology is universal, that its terms—like short-hand writing—will be a customary substitute in travelling literature for all the wordy descriptions we now have to wade through."
