WASHINGTON, Monday, Aug 3. The Veto of the Harbor and River bill was here received and read.

His predecessor had vetoed a bill of this nature and given his reason for so doing. He would add but few of his own.

The power proposed to be used by Congress in this case was unconstitutional and inexpedient. He argued the case at length and recounted the evils to result from the indulgence of the principles in the bill. Aside from constitutional objections, there were others. The bill appropriates between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000. We want the money to carry on the war.

The Speaker put the question : Shall this bill become a law, the President's objections notwithstanding?

Mr. Boyd moved the previous question-decided by tellers, and not seconded-year 82, nays

Mr. Dromgoole cited Washington's veto for a precedent, and moved the House proceed tomorrow to reconsider the bill.

Others said now forthwith. Mr. Donglass discussed the subject and approved the general principles laid down by the President, but not his distinction between salt

and fresh water.

Mr. Thompson, of Pennsylvania denounced the veto and its doctrines, and asked Mr. McClelland if they had not conversed with the President on items of the bill, and if he did not give them to understand before the Tariff bill had been passed by Congress, that all would be right in regard to the River and Harbor bill? If Mr. Polk intended to veto such bill, why did he allow his friends to frame it without telling them what he could approve and what he could not ? Why did his Secretary recommend all these appropriations?

Mr. Wilmot sustained the President and condemued the bill, which he said was passed by log-rolling. Mr. Brodhead sustained the Veto. not for the reasons in it, but because there would be now, that the tariff had been repealed, no money in the treasury to make improvements. Mr. Holmes, of S. C., made a party speech in support of the Veto, and cited the Baltimore Convention ironically in support of his creed on this subject Mr. Tibbatts condemned the Vete, and cited Mr. Polk's annual message, and spoke of his neonsistency.

Mr. Brinkerhoff said it his friends had taken his advice on the Tariff bill, his bill would not have been vetord. He was very animated. Mr. Rhett followed him, and sustained the veto and he principles on which it was based. Mr. Pailey next got the floor, when, on motion, the Youre adjourned.


