Office of the Baltimore American, Nov. 16. FLOUR.—The rate asked is \$5.50, but we do not hear of sales.

We hear of no transactions in City Mills Flour.—There are purchasers at \$5.50, but most of the millers have sold ahead, and others prefer to wait further advices from Europe.

GRAIN.—There is very little wheat offering to day. We quote good prime Md. red at 100a112 cents, and ordinary to good at 90a100 cts.

White Wheat is worth 110a115 cents, and parcels fit for family flour 115a120 cts. On Saturday there was a sale of Pennsylvania white at 84 cents, and of red at 113 cts.

We quote new corn at 55a56 cts. for white, and 50a52 cents for yellow; and old at 60 cents for white, and 65 cents for yellow.

Oats are worth 28a30 cts. WHISKEY.—Sales of blnds. at 23 cents and bls. at 24a24 1/2 cts.—in fair demand.
