

The Mexican force was 350 regular troops, with four pieces of cannon, besides an unknown number of armed peasants, all of whom were posted on strong military works, or in the occupation of stone or brick houses—hence we could not reach them with our great guns, and we were at every disadvantage.

MEXICAN LETTERS OF MARQUE.—We have plenty of news from Mexico, via Havana and Monterey. The general impression is that Tampico will be the next point of attack.

Information has been received in this city that the steamship Flag, on its last trip from Vera Cruz to Havana, took out 300 letters of marque, with naturalization papers, confirming the rights and privileges of Mexican citizens on all who would sail under them. This information comes in an authentic form. It was dated at Mexico, on the 30th ult., and reached Vera Cruz on the evening that the letters by the Flag were mailed, and from thence reached here by way of Havana.

A letter from Havana has also been received here, announcing the arrival of letters of marque. The writer was of opinion that the Spanish Government would not permit the letters to be used in the port of Havana, but as naturalization papers, giving every natural privilege accompanying them, they may slip out despite the vigilance of the authorities.
