

Letter from the Army. The steamer Telegraph, from Brazo 29th ult. and Port Lavoie on the 1st inst., arrived at New Orleans on the 5th with her flag at half mast, having on board the remains of the late Major Ringgold, and Lieut. Cochran, in charge of the Baltimore Committee.

The steamer Monmouth arrived the day previous—the news from Monterey and the posts along the Rio Grande is no later than before received. Mr. A. L. Dauby, who had been employed by the U. States Commission in taking out a sum of money to Gen. Wool, came passenger in the Monmouth, and furnished the following account:—He arrived at Monclova Nov. 6th, where the army was encamped, and in fine condition. He remained there until the 14th when they started for Monterey, accompanied by an escort, with dispatches for Gen. Taylor.

Gen. Butler is Military commander of Monterey Gen. Taylor had been to Saltillo, returned leaving General Worth in possession of that place. It was the impression that the whole of the American forces, except a number necessary to garrison the several forts, in route, would concentrate at Tampico, and that Gen. Taylor in going there will take a line of march, leaving San Louis Potosi to the right; when arriving at Tampico and having the necessary forces on carry on the future operations, an attack will be made on Vera Cruz, simultaneously by sea and land.

The Picayune contains a letter from P-mesa, announcing the arrival of the Porpoise from Tampico, which says: The two regiments which evacuated Tampico revolted when they got to St. Luis Potosi, and were disbanded. They were opposed to Santa Anna. Great dissensions prevailed at St. Luis Potosi—army about 16,000, and in a late of starvation; four different factions among them, as follows: Santa Anna, Arista, Herrera and Parades.

TROOPS FOR MEXICO.—The following troops sailed on Saturday last from New York for Point Isabel, on board the bark Ranger and Walton:— 1st. Lieut. J. H. Gore, 4th Infantry, commanding; Dr. J. Simmons, U. S. A. assistant surgeon; 1st Lieut. J. G. Burbank, 8th Infantry, commanding 100 recruits, 4th Infantry; 1st Lieut. C. D. Jordan, 8th Infantry, commanding 69 recruits, 8th Infantry; 2d Lieut. E. A. Ayres, 3d Artillery, commanding 63 recruits, 8th Infantry; 2d Lieut. T. E. Castor, 2d Dragoons, commanding 60 recruits, 2d Dragoons; Lieut. J. N. G. Whistler, 7th Infantry, commanding 100 recruits, 7th Infantry. Their destination is Tampico—the new base operation against Mexico.

EMBARKATION OF THE VOLUNTEERS.—The Alexandria Volunteers for the Mexican War, under the command of Capt. M. D. Corse, embarked on Saturday last, on board the steamboat homier, on their way to Richmond, where they are to rendezvous until the Virginia regiment is formed. The Volunteers were escorted by a Mount Vernon Guard, and the Ringgold cavalry—the whole battalion under the command of Capt. Snyder.—Alexandria Gaz.

WRITING ON NEWSPAPERS.—A circular has been issued by the Post-office department, directing deputy postmasters to remove the wraps from all transient newspapers, printed circulars, price currents, pamphlets and magazines received at their respective offices, and if and to contain any manuscript or memorandum of any kind, either written or stamped, or any marks or signs, except the name and address of the person to whom it is directed, shall be charged with letter postage, by weight; and the person to whom it is directed shall refuse pay such postage, the postmaster is to send the office from whence it came and have the sender prosecuted for the penalty of \$5. The fine of the sender written or stamped on the wrapper subjects him to the same penalty, if the postmaster will prove that such person really wrote the name, or how he will identify the individual, it is difficult to imagine, ere is no doubt, however, that if he does discover it, his duty will oblige him rigidly to enforce the fine. Individuals sending newspapers will be governed accordingly.

SEPARATION FROM THE CATHOLIC CHURCH.—A statement of some interest to the religious world, occurred at New York on Sunday, at the Temple. A body of some two hundred German Catholics met and made a public and formal separation from the Church. The movement appears to be something similar to that of the Ronge and his adherents in Germany. Germans—Catholics—one of whom was present, has been in the habit of meeting regularly on the Sabbath day, and at other times, several months past, for the purpose of studying the Bible. A statement of these views received at the meeting on Sunday, from which it appears that they are convinced that the Catholic Church was established by Christ his Apostles, and that Rome has superseded that Church some things not originally authorized, and some even which are not only unauthorized, but forbidden by the primitive institution. Their plan is reformation, not union with any Protestant sect, for all those they are with disapprobation.

SECRETARY.—We learn by passengers on New York, says the Louisville Journal, that there were some 300 men under arms at Fort Micks, Illinois, awaiting transportation—evidently excitement seemed to prevail.

THE CASTLE AT VERA CRUZ. An Extra from the Norfolk Herald says that the ordnance department at Fort Monroe, under the accomplished officer, Capt. Benjamin Huger, are busily engaged in preparing howitzer batteries, bombs, rockets, &c. to be sent to Mexico upon a requisition of Major Gen. Scott, and that a company of one hundred men specially qualified for that service are to go with them in charge of Capt. Huger, with Lieut. Charles P. Stone, Lieut. Hagner from Washington, and another officer whose name we have not learned. They are expected to be in readiness to leave Fort Monroe about the 1st of January, direct for Tampico. The inference (for we know nothing certain as to their ultimate destination) is, that they will join the army under Gen. Scott at Tampico, and proceed with it to Vera Cruz, to bombard the castle of St. Juan d'Ulloa.

DEPARTURE OF OFFICERS.—Major Turnbull, Capt. J. E. Johnston, Lieut. Scammon, Derby, and Hardcastle, all officers of the corps of topographical engineers, left Washington on Sunday, for the army of the West, and expect to join Gen. Scott, at Braso Santiago.
