

GOVERNMENT POSTAGE.—During the year ending 30th June last, the treasury department paid to the post-office \$250,383 83, postage on mail matter received at Washington city for officers of the government, who, under the old law, received their letters, &c., at the expense of the post-office department. Of this sum \$109,816 40 was for matter received by the postmaster general, \$22,349 14 by the House of Representatives and its clerks, \$7,282 80 by the Senate and its clerks, \$724,08, by the President and Vice President, \$2,031 by the Secretary of the Navy, \$2,031 56 by the Secretary of State, and \$2,787 74 by the Secretary of the Treasury.
