tended to them. The call, it will be perceived, is for "six months' volunteers," but it will be recollected that, under an act of Congress, no volunteers can be received for a less term than 12 months, or until the expiration of the war. But ,notwithstanding this "fixed fact." the Governor expresses his readiness, with his accustomed patriotic fervor, 'to pull off his cost and go to work to raise volunteers, and he hopes all good citizens will aid him." This hope he will assurelly realize ; for the citizens of Louisiana. of all parties, will stand by their Chief Magistrate in any responsibility he may assume in this emergency. When our country is engaged in war, Louisianians will throw aside party, and Whig and Democrats will gallantly come to the rescue. The veteran, Gen. Brooke, in command of the Western division of the army, has signified his willingness to muster the troops that may offer into the sevice of the United States, and it Col. Hunt, the United States Quartermaster, will furnish the means of transportation, as we cannot doubt under the circumstances he will, the Governor, immediately on this fact being ascertained, will issue his proclamation for one regiment of volunteers at a time, and when that is full, then for another ; by which time intelligence will probably be received from Washing-
