

**Senor Atocha's Proposition to Mexico.**  
The terms indicated by Senor Atocha, in his letter to Rejon, as the propositions of the United States to Mexico to obtain a peace, are found in the Diario del Gobierno, of Mexico, copied from a paper of Guadalajara, without a word of dissent. They are as follows:  
A commission shall be named to arrange the conditions. This commission shall be composed of Messrs. Denton and Buchanan and one member of Congress of the opposition, and two Mexican commissioners. The commission shall assemble wherever the government of Mexico may appoint.  
The United States demand the parallel of 26 deg. of latitude from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific, as the dividing line.  
The United States will pay fifteen millions of dollars in cash for the territory occupied, annually engaging not to exact or claim any exorbitant amount of thirteen millions; consequently the United States consider that they would pay twenty-eight millions of dollars for the territory described.  
The United States guarantee that it will never consent that any territory or State of Mexico shall be annexed to the American Union; it equally guarantees the sovereignty of Mexico, especially her territory south of the parallel of 26 deg.  
The United States will place ten thousand men, infantry and cavalry upon the boundary line, to prevent smuggling and incursions of Indians.  
The United States engage to adjust all disputes about old claims—we give the remainder a Spanish, *pro el territorio cedido por las deudas extrangeras, &c.*  
The alliance, offensive and defensive, shall be signed between the United States and Mexico to repel European intervention in the affairs of America.  
Atocha is authorized by the government of the United States to adjust the terms of the treaty of peace.

**THE ROBBERY AND ATTEMPTED MURDER IN CHEVYCHILL COUNTY.**—We learn from the Potomac Press, that the individual who is suspected of having robbed Mr. Lawrence Brennan, a drover, last week, near Coal Castle, and wounded him several times, by a shot from a revolving pistol, is likely to be arrested. From the description given by Brennan, of the ruffian, suspicion was fixed upon Patrick Moran, or Boran as he is sometimes called, who lived in Coal Castle. A party went out to arrest him—some of his friends gave him alarm, and he fled. They found in the house ramrod such as is used for the revolving pistol, together with a number of slugs, bullets, and a mould for bullets, corresponding in size to one which was fired at Brennan. Moran is still at large, though believed to be in the neighborhood.
