Senor Atocha's Proposition to Mexico.

The terms indicated by Seaor Atocha, in his letter to Rejon, as the propositions of the United States to Mexico to obtain a peace, are found in the Diario del Gobierno, of Mexico, copied from a paper of Guadalafara, without a word of dissent. They are as follows:

A commission shall be named to arrange the conditions. This commission shall be conposed of Messrs, Benton and Bachanan and one mem er of Congress of the opposition, and two Mexican commissioners. The commission shall as remble wherever the government of Mexico may appoint.

The United States demand the parallel of 26 leg. of latitude from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific, as the dividing line.

The United States will pay fifteen millions of dollars in cash for the territory occupied, socounty engaging not to exact or claim any exrenses of the war. These expenses are estinated at about thirteen millions ; consequently he United States consider that they would pay wenty-eight millions of dollars for the territoy described.

The United States guaranties that it will over consent that any territory or State of Mexico shall be annexed to the American Uniin; it equally guaranties the sovereignty of M-xico, especially her territory south of the paallel of 26 deg.

The United States will 'place ten thousand men, infantry and cavalry upon the boundary me, to prevent smuggling and incursions of .ndians

The United States engage to adjust all dissutes about old claims-we give the remainder a Spanish, [pro el territorio cedido poriteiras, deudas extrangeras, dec.]

The alliance, offensive and defensive, shall e signed between the United States and Mexco to repel European intervention in the affairs of America.

Atocha is authorized by the government of he United States to adjust the terms of the reaty of peace.

From the description riven by Brennan, of the ruffian, suspicion was ixed upon Patrick Moran, or Boran as he is someimes called, who lived in Coal Castle. A party vent out to arrest him-some of his friends gave he alarm, and he fled. They found in the house ramrod such as is used for the revolving pisals, together with a number of slugs, bullets, nd a mould for bullets, corresponding in size to ne which was fired at Brennan. Moran is still t large, though believed to be in the neighborood.
