

Meeting of the Farmers' Club. ... On the 27th ult., the New York Club held an adjourned meeting, Judge Van Wick in the chair, and a fair attendance of members.

From the translations from the French read, we learn that M. Hardy, director of the nurseries of Algeria, states that the flowering of the *Passiflora* in that region is as much retarded as in Paris. Mr. Gabriel Wakeman, from Herkimer county, in this State, then described most voluminously the cheese manufacture in his region. He stated among other incidentalities, that swine should never be nearer than 100 feet to the dairy, whereas they are often more than 15 or 20 feet removed.
