It was rather a cold, rainy day when this occurred: The deck hands and many others on the boat did not know Gen. Tayfor. Tayfor laid down and went to sleep. At supper time great inquiries were made for the general. and servants sent off to look him up. But he could not be found ! At last some one, going bolow, inquired of a fireman if he had seen anying of such and such a man-the fireman said no, but added, "there is a clever old fellow asheep there under the sail, in front of the five !" it was Gen. Taylor.
