He wrote to his former captain, stating that he was at the head of 300 men, (deserters) and if he wished to see discipline, he had better follow him. He also said he would attack the train between Vera Cruz and Jalapa.

“Us with the Tent.”—The friends of Gen. Taylor held a meeting on the night of the 22d, in New York, at Niblo's, under a tent. The call was a loud one—being signed by three thousand freedmen! “By St. Paul! the work goes bravely on!”

Iron blast furnaces have multiplied greatly in Virginia during the past year. Five are now in blast in Botetourt county, under the management of Eastern men. That state is perhaps the richest in iron ores in the United States.

A New Article of Export.—Some of our citizens have commenced shipping ice from this region to Philadelphia and elsewhere, and we learn that two or three contracts for large amounts of the commodity have been entered into with dealers in the former place. It is believed that at least 15,000 tons will be shipped the present year, and supposing it to be worth \$3 to \$2 50 or more per ton, deliverable at Philadelphia, it will be readily perceived that the trade has some importance. Our streams are situated between rugged mountains, and the water upon many of them is slack, and perfectly clear and sparkling. The ice, therefore, cannot be excelled anywhere, and attains an unusual thickness. This year its average thickness is about 16 inches, and we doubt whether this measure has been obtained elsewhere upon narrow fresh water streams. The mildness of the weather during the last two weeks has been very unfavorable to its growth—*Mesa's Journal.*
