The next May I enclosed, with a very high fonce, 11 acres of rolling ground, with a DICORODODD11200. well of water in it, and put the same mulca and horses-cut the same field of clover, and hauled the fresh grass to them every day, and fed it from racks choicest styles and latest fashions. and box troughs, 3 by 5 feet. The result was, that the field fed them as much as they could eat all summer. As soon as the first grop was cut, the second was ready to begin on. The second crop caused them to slobber. To prevent that, I had hauled every day some horse weeds, which they eat with avidity ; instinct, I suppose, teaches them its effects.
