We are often surprised at the dilatoriness f some farmers in removing their corn from the field. In many places we see it standog from the time it is cut in September to the middle of November. By this time the mently become mouldy by rains and the fodder utterly ruined. Cattle and even horses cat the fodder with avidity, prefering it to second-crop hay, and by steaming it and mixed with a little Indian meal, the whole, stalks and all, are greedily consumed. Yet we see this valuable provender remain exposed to the weather until it is worthless. Plows, harrows, rollers, wagons, wheelbarrows, &c. are frequently exposed to the reather for weeks and even months, while ces of shelter are close at hand. They fer more injury from this exposure than from half a year's use. And there is no other excuse for this than a plea of a want of time, which every good farmer will say is no excuse at all.

Before the winter closes in there should be a thorough examination of all the fences. ates, doors of the stables, &c. It will be found to be a great saving if everything is put in good order now. A rotten post, a rail with one end down, a broken hings of a gate or door, will not get any better by al. lowing them to remain unrepaired. The post will go down, the rail will disappear, the broken hinge will be increased to two. and so on, everything will be getting worse, and the expenses of repairing will be double. -Germantown Telegraph.

CRIB BITING .- Cribbing is undoubtedly habit rather than a disease. This, it would seem, is proved by the fact that a young horse confined in a stable next to an old horse who is a cribber, will soon acquire the habit. It is very common among horses that are constantly kept in a stable and may be caused by the animal siezing upon cribbiting as a solitary pastime, to while away the tiresome hours of stable life. Cribbing may be prevented if taken in hand during its early stages. First attend to the atmosphere of the stable, rendering it pure by careful ventilation. Place a lump of rock salt in the manger. This acts as a stimulant to the stomach, and will often enable the horse's digestion to recover its lost tone. If this does not effect a cure add to it a large piece of chalk. Should this prove to do no good, demp the food and at each time of feeding damp the food, and at each time of feeding sprinkle magnesia upon it. Mayhew also ommends a handful of ground oak bark to be given with each feed of grain. Should none of the above measures prove of benefit. we should come to the conclusion that the disease was of more a obstinate nature and should treat as in chronic indigestion. - Maine Farmer.
