COMMUNICATION.

Hon. Philip Noon. Our venerable fellow citizen is no more! He breathed his last in the arms of his family, on Saturday morning last, aged 76 years and one month.

The career of Judge Noon was a long and eventful one. He was born in Donegal, Ireland, the 5th day of February, 1784. At the age of 18 he was bearer of despatches for the United Irishmen, and, as such, was arrested and imprisoned. This was during the period of the so-called Irish Rebellion.

He soon afterwards settled at Blair's Gap, where he taught a school, and was received into the family of John Blair, Esq., with whom he was an especial favorite. He became a citizen of our county prior to its organization, as such, and continued his residence here until the time of his decease.

In 1818 he was elected to the Legislature, and traditions pronounce him to have been an active and useful member of that body.

In the struggle between Shultz and Gregg for the office of Governor of Pennsylvania, in 1823—the last election under the old organization of parties—he warmly advocated the election of the former—and by him was appointed Prothonotary, &c., which offices he held for nine years, and again retired in 1832.

In 1843 Gov. Porter gave him the appointment of Associate Judge, from which office, he, with his venerable compeer, Judge Murray, retired in 1851;—on which occasion the Ebensburg Bar tendered them a public supper for the correctness and purity of their official conduct.

From the latter period Judge Noon has lived the life of a quiet, unobtrusive citizen. While in his intercourse with the world, those "high social qualities which adorned his character, and made him a favorite in every circle, shone with undiminished lustre;—and much more in the exercise of that greatest of all Christian virtues—charity.
