THE POST-OFFICE BILL A LAW.—ITS PROVISIONS .- The President having approved of the post-office bill, it is therefore

a law. As amended previous to its passage, it appropriates \$4,296,000 for supplying the deficiency in the revenues and defraying the expenses of the department for the year ending with June last, and toward the support of the department for the fiscal year ending June next, \$4,000,000; and the further sum of \$2,400,000 in payment of the salaries of officers and clerks, and for the transportation of the mails, wrapping paper, bags, stamps, &c.

Interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum-to commence sixty days after the one door west of his residence. expiration of the quarter in which the service was rendered, but in no cases prior to the 1st of May, 1859, to the present date -shall be paid on all sums found due to the contractors themselves, in full for all damages by reason of the failure or delay in the payment. No interest is allowed on the payments for the last quarter, ending with December. A sum for this purpose is appropriated.


