4. Let it harmonize with the colors of your dress.

5. Let it have some use. Men should never, like women, wear jewels for mere ornament, whatever may be the fashion of Hungarian noblemen, and deposed Indian rajahs, with jackets covered with rubies.

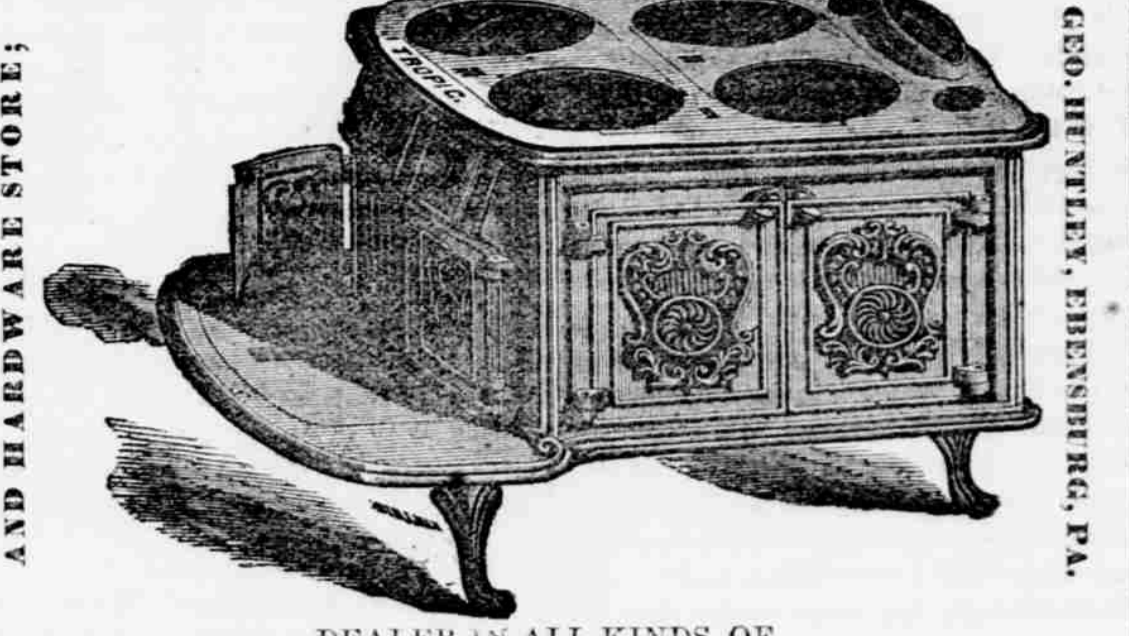
