WHEAT.—The yield is so large in some localities of Minnesota, that owners of threshing machines are offering to thresh out the product of some fields for the excess over thirty bushels an acre.

The committee on farms of the State Agricultural Society of Wisconsin, have made a careful estimate, from which they set down the wheat crop of Wisconsin for the year 1860 at twenty-two millions of bushels.

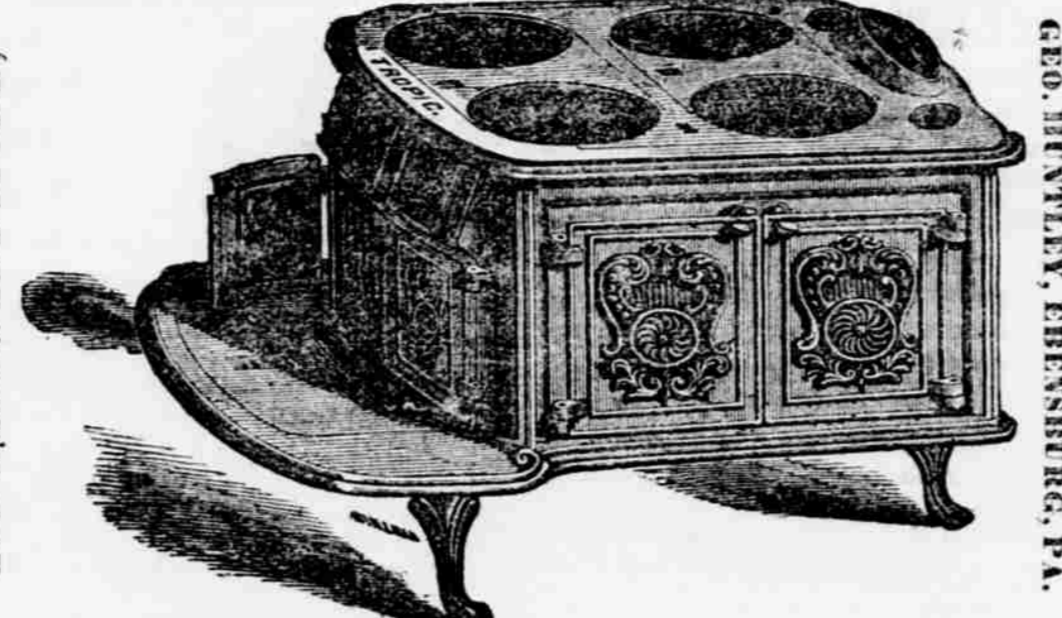

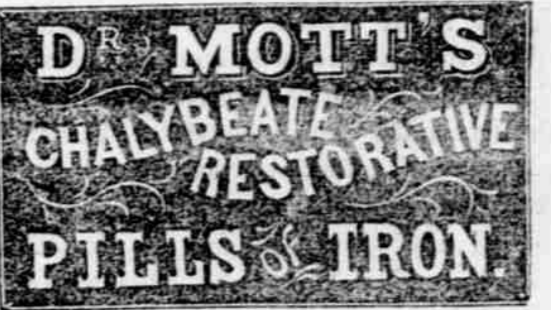
