

#### The Last Demonstration.

According to previous notice, the Ebensburg "Wide Awakes" matle their final demonstration before the election on Monday evening. At 7 o'clock, the members of the Club, to the number of about fifty, armed and equipped with capes, caps and lanterns, together with a large number of privates in the Republican army, met at the Town Hall. After some business had been gone through with, the procession was formed and the line of march taken up. Preceded by the Ebensburg Band, they paraded down High street to the residence of A. A. Barker, Esq., where loud calls were made for that gentleman. He responded in a neat and pithy exordium calling upon the People to do only their duty and all would be right. Repeated cheers were given to the speaker at the conclusion of his address, and the procession moved on. It then traversed the principal streets, receiving fresh augmentations each moment, until the crowd was swelled to several hundreds. The large concourse then adjourned to the Hall, where eloquent addresses were delivered by N. I. Roberts, John H. Evans, and others .--After three times three had been given with a will for Lincoln and Hamlin, the people of the People, the meeting adjourned.


