A GREAT MAN.—George Lippard, in his work called the "Nazarene," thus speaks of President Jackson: "He was a man! Well I remember the day I waited upon him. He sat there in his arm-chair—I can see him now. We told him of the public distress—the manufacturers ruined—the shrouded eagles in crape, which were carried at the head of 20,000 men into Independence Square. He heard us all. We begged him to leave the deposits where they were, to uphold the great bank at Philadelphia. Still he did not say a word. At last one of our members, more fiery than the rest, intimated that if the bank was crushed a rebellion might follow. Then the old man arose—I can see him yet. "Come," he shouted, in a voice of thunder, as his clenched hand was raised high above his white hair, "come with bayonets in your hands, instead of your petitions—surround the White House with your legions—I am ready for you! With the people at my back, whom your gold can neither awe nor buy, I will swing you up around the Capitol—each one of you on a gibbet as high as Haman's!" "When I think," says the author, "of that one man standing there at Washington, battling against all the powers of bank and panic combined, betrayed by those in whom he trusted—assailed by all that the snake of malice could hiss or the fiend of falsehood howl—when I think of that one man placing his back against the rock, and folding his arms for the blow, while he uttered his vow: "I will not swerve one inch from the course I have taken."—I must confess that the records of Rome—say the proudest days of Cromwell or Napoleon—cannot furnish an instance of a will like that of Andrew Jackson, when he placed life and soul and fame on the hazard of a die for the people's welfare."

THE STATE LUNATIC ASYLUM.—The annual report of this institution has been issued. At the date of the last report, there were two hundred and fifty-four patients in the institution, since which two hundred and eleven have been admitted, and one hundred and ninety-one have been discharged, or died, leaving two hundred and seventy-four under care at the close of the year. The total number of patients in the hospital during the year, was four hundred and sixty-five. The highest number at any one time was two hundred and fifty; and the average number under treatment, during the whole period, was two hundred and seventy-three. The number of males in the hospital during the year was two hundred and sixty-three and the number of females was two hundred and two. The highest number of males at any one time was one hundred and fifty-seven, and the highest number of females was one hundred and thirty-one. At the beginning of the year, there were one hundred and thirty-two males, and one hundred and twenty-three females.—The number of males admitted during the year was one hundred and thirty-one, and the number of females eighty. Since the hospital was opened in 1841, three thousand five hundred and seventy-one persons have been admitted; of these two hundred and seventy-four still remain. Among them, were one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six males, and of these the largest number of any profession were farmers—two hundred and seventy-eight. There were one hundred and seventy-three merchants, one hundred and forty-two clerks, sixty-six students, twenty-three clergymen, thirty-eight physicians, sixty-nine carpenters, one hundred and forty-six laborers, four police officers, twenty-five blacksmiths, one author, seventeen artists, thirty-five tailors, fifty-six shoemakers, and two hundred and forty-four of no occupation.

THE WAR RAFT.—This machine, now building at Charleston harbor, is said to have sides of iron and palmetto logs, and on the inside of these is to be placed a layer of cotton bales, thus making a solid wall of from five to six feet in thickness on the attacking side, while on the other side and ends it will not be any stronger than is necessary to resist the effect of the concussion in the firing of the guns. It will be partly filled with water, which it is supposed, will destroy the effect of the bombs which fall into it; consequently there is a large opening left in the deck. It will mount four guns, which are now lying side of it—three 32-pounders and one 44-pounder. They will be mounted all on one side, it being the only one that is protected, the other side and ends having only a railing around them. In regard to its efficacy, opinions differ, but among the soldiers it has the opprobrious epithet of "Slaughter Pen," and each company are fearful that they shall be called upon to man it. From the material of which it is built, it must be extremely combustible, and heated shot will be very apt to set it on fire. Again, it will have to be moored and kept in exact position, for if it swings round, or its moorings are cut, as they might be by chain shot, it would be completely at the mercy of the fort, which might easily sweep the exposed deck by grape or canister shot.

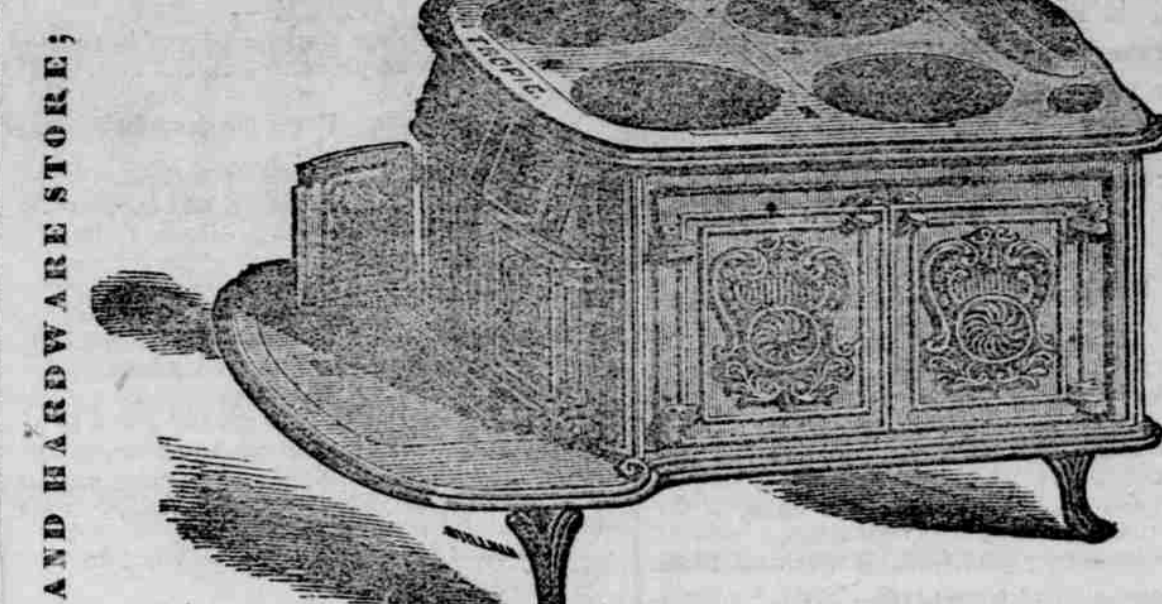
