GRAFFING THE GRAPE.—In the February number of the Genessee Farmer, the following article appears:

can be got away from the stock to be Ebensburg, Pa. grafted upon, clean away the stem two or three inches deep, saw or cut off the vine smooth; then prepare your graft, (which should have been cut from the vine in the early part of the winter.)

If your stock is thick, say one inch or more in diameter, cut out a wedge, to correspond with the wedge on the graft; if the stock be less than three-fourths of an inch in diameter, then merely split down | counties. Office in Colonade Row. clean, as in the usual way of cleft grafting, but if the graft be not held firmly, it is well to tie around the split with a bit of matting or strong thread, which will rot off before doing any damage. When you have inserted the graft, draw the earth in and press firmly around the joint where operated upon, and up to and barely exposing the bud, filling in with dry mould if the earth be wet. Use no cement whatever; I believe it is a great evil.

straw or some kind of rubbish that will not pack tight; this is to keep the frost from hoisting out the graft, in case freezing occurs afterward, which frequently is the case, as I have grafted in February sometimes, as well as to shade the bud and keep the air off somewhat -a necessary precaution. When the graft begins to grow, the natural or stock suckers must be kept down or they will soon rob the graft. I have usually succeeded in this way .-For root grafting in the house, my best success has been obtained when done in the spring, when the vines begin to grow.

One important part has almost been overlooked. You must select stocks of as near similar wood; for instance, the Delaware will hardly take at all on a rank fox, while upon the Clinton and our wild frost grape it takes very treely. Almost any kind will take upon the Isabella.

Horness .- Now is the time to make hotbeds. Make a pile of horse manure a few feet square and two or three feet thick. Nail four rough boards together in the form of a box without top or bottom, set it upon the pile of manure and fill it with good soil to the depth of four or five inches. Cover the bed with glass, (old window sash will do,) and in two days it will be warm enough to receive the seed. Tomatoes, cabbages and lettuce are the most suitable plants to force.

COAL ASHES -Coal ashes are stated, by some who have tried experiments with them, to be excellent for putting around the roots of peach trees and gooseberry bushes in the spring. They are generally held to be of no use whatever, but as they contain some traces of potash and considerable lime, they will no doubt tend to destroy grubs and worms.


