No person of a foreign State and not a citizen of the confederate States, is allowed to yote for any officer, either civil or political, State or federal. Under the first census; South Carolina is entitled to five representatives in Congress; Georgia to ten representatives; Alabama to nine representatives; Florida to two representatives; Mississippi to seven representaand Texas to six representatives; each State to have two Senators. The State Legislatures may impeach a judicial or federal officer, resident and acting in said State, by a two-thirds vote. Both branches of Congress may grant seats on the floor of either House to the principal officer of each executive department, with the privilege of discussing the measures of his department. The representation of threefifths of the slaves is continued. Congress is not allowed, through the imposition of duties, to foster any branch of street, opposite the Post Office. industry. The foreign slave trade is prohibited. Congress is prohibited from making appropriations unless by a vote of two-thirds of both Houses, except when of some department or the President. 
