Goughenour and Philip Williams, of Johnstown, and Elijah Fuller, of Maryland, were arrested in Johnstown on Tuesday of last week, on a charge of making and passing counterfeit money. The arlice, was managed very successfully. Information having been conveyed to U.S. Marsh. Murdock to the effect that these par-Wild pigeons are said to be very plenty ties were engaged in making and passing spurious money, several policemen were detailed to make the arrest. They employed the famous detective, Newcomer, to visit Johnstown and "lay the ropes." Several of the defendants admitted to him that they were in possession of counterfeit money, and that they manufactured it
