ILLUSTRATED ENVELOPES.—Scarcely an envelope is now sold that does not bear upon it a loyal device or motto, and the mania for this species of patriotism is daily growing more intense. Among the recent issues are many worthy of notice. One design represents the American eagle reading into small links a belligerent rattlesnake, which coils about the shattered staff and torn bunting of a secession flag. Beneath is the inscription, "The eagle shall bear the rattlesnake in his beak, and shall read him with his talons." The shrewd and fearless face of Gen. Butler figures on one envelope, with an extract from one of his letters, "Whatever our policies, the government must be sustained." Jeff Davis's doom represents that person lying prostrate upon his throated sword, a bowie-knife lying from his hand, and the expression issuing from his white lips, "Let me alone." A Zouave, bearing the American flag in one hand, introduces a sabre bayonet between Jeff's ribs, at the same time observing, "I will, severely." A huge bell, marked "Liberty," bears beneath it the legend, "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof." There are several portraits of the lamented Ellsworth, all with legends denoting the national grief at his loss. One of them bears a beautiful extract from his last letter to his parents: "He who noteth the fall of a sparrow will have some purpose even in the fate of one like me." From the smoke and flames of Fort Sumter emerges the placid Goddess of Liberty, bearing in one hand the national banner and in the other the scales of justice. The design is at once typical and beautiful.

A gentleman just returned from abroad says that he heard a prayer by the Rev. Mr. Spurgeon, in his church in London, on a recent Sunday evening, in behalf of President Lincoln and the cause of the North, which he characterizes as the most beautiful and powerful prayer he ever heard in his life. The whole audience was moved to tears, and some even sobbed aloud, at the eloquent preacher's appeals to God and to civilized mankind in aid of so holy and so righteous a cause as that in which the North is engaged.

John Ross, principal chief of the Cherokees, has issued a sensible proclamation urging his people to be true to their treaties with the Union and to take no part in the war. The Arkansas rebel leaders are greatly disappointed at this.

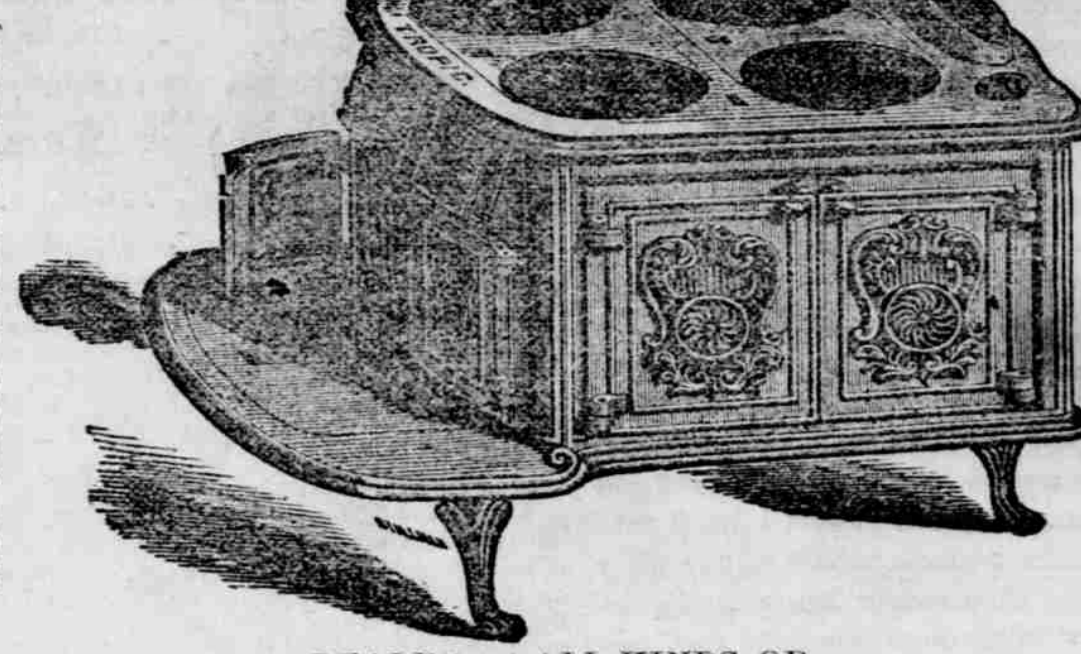
