CAMP TENNELLY, September 22, 1861. Correspondence of The Alleghenian. Fort Pennsylvania, on which the 11th have been working for some time recently, has been completed, and fifteen guns mounted.

On Saturday morning the different Brigades of the Reserve were reviewed by Gen. McClellan and McCull.

The health of the troops, as a general thing, is good. There are several cases of Typhoid fever in some of the Regiments; one in the 11th, and also a few cases of Agno.

We have been favored with very pleasant weather for the last few days. Co. A enjoys good health, and the men are in excellent spirits.

HEAVY RAIN-STORM.—We were favored with a tremendous storm of wind and rain last week, commencing on Thursday evening and continuing without intermission until Saturday night.
