Letter from the "Silver Grays."

CAMP CURTIN, Jan'y. 28, 1862. Correspondence of The Alleghanian.

Never since the first suggestion to raise and tender to the Government the services of a company of volunteers composed of men who have passed the age of two-and-a-fourth scores of years, has so great an enthusiasm been manifested in our quarters as "reigns supreme" this evening.

A most interesting scene was exhibited the other day, while the companies in camp were on dress parade. The glorious news of the success of the Federal arms in Kentucky had just been received, per telegraph, by Governor Curtin.

It has been officially announced that Camp Curtin will hereafter be the only camp in Pennsylvania that will be recognized by the General Government.
