Benuett, under command of their First Lieutenant, were at Hannahan's plantalarge island and the main force by a creek, the bridge over which was destroyed by the rebels, and their retreat completely cut off .-This insignificant force, thus attacked by 500 rebels, maintained a desperate defence for an hour, falling back toward the bridge, of whose destruction they were unaware, availing themselves of the inequalities of the ground as a cover, and partially screened by the thick fog. through which, however, the flashes of their petrayed them to the enemy. steadily maintained this unequal conflict, until when within a hundred yards of the bridge their ammunition gave out, and no other defence was possible. Still, they would not surrender, but, throwing their muskets into banks. Five men escaped by swimming, and were afterward picked up by one of the Crusader's boats. Five are known to have been killed during the fight. The remaining twenty some of them wounded, are missing, and undoubtedly prisoners.'
