R. N. Evans, formerly 1st sergeant of Co. C, (20th Illinois), and lately promoted to be 1st Lieutenant of Co. I for gallantry at Fort Donelson, and who had not yet received his commission, was fighting gallantly in Co. C. When our color sergeant fell badly wounded, Rolla seized the colors and bore them bravely aloft, shaking them defiantly at the enemy until he fell, badly wounded in the ankle.
