SAD OCCURRENCE-BOY SHOT .- We copy the following from the Johnstown Tribune of last week: A young man named Soaf, who carries the mail between packed and forwarded. Johnstown and Stoystown. After riding in company for some time, the boys meanwhile having their fun with each other, Hartzell, under the impression that it was empty, pointed his gun at the mail boy, and playfully told him if he didn't behave he would shoot him. The young man. disregarding the threat, kept on with his fun, when Hartzell levelled his gun at him and pulled the trigger, when to his amazement it discharged, and Scaf fell from his horse. Upon examination, it was discovered that the ball had taken offeet in his face, and that he was already quite dead. Hartzell remained with the body until the Somerset back came along, which took up the body and brought it to town. Hartzell came along and gave himself up. He claims that he had a distinet recollection of discharging the gun. but had no recoilection of again loading it, and was under the impression that it was empty when he said he would shoot.

THE ENROLLMENT .- The enrollmen of the militia in this district is now almost completed, some three or four districts only remaining to be heard from. Thus far, the total number returned as being subject to draft is 4,000-a due proportion of which, of course, will be exempted by the surgeon and commissioner. Of the number, 1,500 are now actually in the service. Beside this number, some 150 Cambrians have enlisted in the regular army, for whom we receive no credit .---When all the figures are in, it will be found that Cambria has about sixteen hundred men in the field;

Russell in relation to the draft, that these high officials stated that the ratio would be one in about every seventeen or eighteen of the total population, and that any district that has already sent volunteers in that proportion would not be drafted, while those that were short of that ratio would be required to make up the deficiency, whatever that may be. If this be so, Cambria county may escape a draft altogether.
