

EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, May 5, 1862, trains on this road will run as follows:

SAD OCCURRENCE—BOY SHOT.—We copy the following from the Johnstown Tribune of last week: A young man named Gillis Hartzell was out gunning on Thursday, and in coming home along the Somerset road in the afternoon, in company with two other boys, in a wagon, they were overtaken by a young man named Seaf, who carries the mail between Johnstown and Stoytown.

THE ENROLLMENT.—The enrollment of the militia in this district is now almost completed, some three or four districts only remaining to be heard from.

THE JOHNSTOWN TRIBUNE is informed by a gentleman who recently had a conversation with Gov. Curtin and Adjutant Gen. Russell in relation to the draft, that these high officials stated that the ratio would be one in about every seventeen or eighteen of the total population, and that any district that has already sent volunteers in that proportion would not be drafted.

FROM THE MOUNTAIN GUARDS.—We are without our usual letter from this company this week, but learn from private sources that the regiment to which it belongs—the 133d Penna.—left Arlington Heights for Alexandria on last Wednesday evening, arriving at the latter place at 12 o'clock at night.

SECRETARY TO GOVERNOR CURTIN.—We are glad to announce the appointment of our friend, A. C. Mullin, Esq., of this place, to the important position of Confidential Secretary to Governor Curtin, vice Col. Quay, resigned.

TO THE LOYAL WOMEN AND CHILDREN OF THE UNITED STATES.—The following circular has been issued from the Surgeon General's Office, at Washington: "The supply of lint in the market is nearly exhausted. The brave men wounded in defense of their country will soon be in want of it. I appeal to you to come to our aid in supplying us with this necessary article. There is scarcely a woman or child who cannot scrape lint, and there is no way in which their assistance can be more usefully given than in furnishing us the means to dress the wounds of those who fall in defense of their rights and their homes."

IN accordance with this request, several boxes of lint, bandages, etc., have already been prepared and forwarded by the ladies of this place, and more will be forthcoming soon. Those wishing to contribute anything in this behalf are requested to leave their offerings at the Ebensburg Post Office, where they will be duly packed and forwarded.

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.—Mr. Henry Ely, of Johnstown, has been appointed Superintendent of the Common Schools of this county, vice Mr. Wm. A. Scott, resigned and gone soldiering. The appointment is a most excellent one, Mr. Ely being and having been for years a teacher by profession, and therefore perfectly conversant with any wants of the community in an educational point of view.

FAIR!—The Highland Agricultural Society, of Johnstown, has issued posters for their second exhibition, to be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, 18th, 19th and 20th September, inst. Preparations are being made to render it unusually attractive.

SAD NEWS.—It is generally understood that Capt. Wm. Linton's cavalry company, from this county, attached to the 12th Penna. cavalry, was considerably cut up on the occasion of the Rebel Gen. Stuart's late dash upon the railroad near Manassas—along which the regiment was stationed as guard. No definite particulars of the affair have yet reached us.

MEDICAL EXAMINER.—Dr. John Lowman, of Johnstown, has been appointed by Governor Curtin Medical Examiner for this county under the draft law.

APPOINTMENTS.—Saml. J. Royer, Esq., of Johnstown, has received the appointment of Collector of this district, under the Federal Tax Law. Thomas P. Campbell, Esq., of Huntingdon, is appointed Assessor.
