THE TAX ON TOBACCO.-The heavy tax on tobacco imposed under the internal revenue law, is already beginning to be felt here, and a considerable falling off in the demand for the article is experienced. Our readers have but a faint idea of the extent to which this tax must effect the tobacco trade; but when we state that under the law some of our manufacturers will have to pay \$200 a day to the Government, they will be better able to arrive at an intelligent conclusion on the subject. There is another thing, too, which will operate against the manufacturers, unless their whole system of business be revolutionized. They generally give a credit of four months on their sales, but under the law they are required to make returns every month to the collector. They will thus be compelled to pay the tax long before they receive payment for the tobacco, a thing which, considering the great result of this will be, they will have to do Jelly Cake Moulds, Table and Tea Spoons, a cash business exclusively, or none at all.
