A new infernal machine, claimed to be adequate for the destruction of iron-clad vessels, is undergoing government tests at the royal dockyard of Copenhagen. The apparatus, which is extremely simple, and costs but little, consists of a glass reservoir filled with powder, floating at a certain depth, where, by very simple chemical means, it produces an explosion. In the first experiment, when loaded with a very small charge, the effect was amazing. The framework of the gunboat used was shattered, and some of the planks thrown to a height of eighty or one hundred feet. On' a second trial the explosion threw up a column of water one hundred feet high, and the shock was felt at a considerable distance.

A correspondent of the Baltimore Clipper says: We chanced this morning to be in the reception room of Secretary Stanton, when that energetic functionary in a most dry and humorous manner, as is his wont, "took down" a pair of shoulder-straps, which article abounds munificently just now in the Federal capital. The aforesaid strap was saying some-

thing about his desire to command the body guard of some General. "Bodyguard," quoth Secretary Stanton, "why sir, General-in-chief Halleck tells me that the only body-guard he ever had was a bullterrier pup."

A wooden legged amateur happened to be with a skirmishing party lately, when a shell burst near him, smashing his artificial limb to bits, and sending a piece of iron through the calf of a soldier near him.

The soldier "grinned and bore it" like a man, while the amateur was loud and emphatic in lamentation. Being rebuked by the wounded soldier, he replied, "Oh, yes, it's all well enough for you to bear it. -Your leg did not cost anything, and will heal up; but I paid \$200 cash for mine."

The Rebel rough rider, John Morgan, made a dash into Lexington, Ky., on Saturday morning, but did not stay. Our men fought awhile, but he was too strong for them; we had six killed, and 125 were taken prisoners, but immediately paroled. On Sunday, when between Versailles and Frankfort, Morgan was met by 2,500 of Gen Dumont's cavalry, who, after a short fight, routed and dispersed the Rebels. Lexington is now in possession of Union troops.
