ODDS & ENDS.

THE VENANGO OIL FLEET.-But few persons not intimately connected with the petroleum business can form an adequate idea of the extent of the carrying trade which this product involves. On Monday last, says the editor of the Oil City Register, we took a trip along our wharves, and up the creek a short distance, in order to ascertain the number of oil boats now on hand. As near as we could ascertain, there are 525 boats, consisting of flats, French creekers, and barges, now engaged. or waiting to be employed in this immediate vicinity. The value of these boats will range from \$600 each to \$125. The number of steam tow boats engaged in this business last year was fourteen, lued at from \$10,000 to \$15,000 each, but we learn that several more will be added this season. Besides these there are seven passenger steamers, we understand, to be placed on this route the present season. The value of these boats is about \$20,000 cach.

Thus we have some 525 oil boats, probably not less than eighteen steam tow boats, and seven passenger steamers in the oil trade. This petroleum navy employs directly and indirectly the services of between 3,000 and 4,000 men; and the business is increasing fully one-third larger every year. What other locality can beat this in the same length of time?

LANGUAGE OF THE AMERICAN FLAG. -The following explanation of the colors and symbolic meaning of the "Stars and Stripes," was written by a member of the old Continental Congress, to whom, with others, was committed the duty of selecting a flag for the infant confederacy :-The stars of the new flag represent the new constellation of States rising in the West. The idea was taken from the constellation Lyra, which in the hand of Orpheus signifies harmony. The blue in the field was taken from the edges of the Covenanter's banner in Scotland, significant of the league covenant of the United Colonies against oppression, involving the virtues of vigilance, perseverance and justice. The stars were in a circle, symbolizing the perpetuity of the Union; the ring, like the circling serpent of the Egyptians, signifying eternity. The thirteen stripes showed, with the stars, the number of the United Colonies, and denoted the subordination of the States to the Union, as well as equality among themselves. The whole was the blending of the various flags previous to the Union flags, viz: the red flag of the armies and the white of the floating batteries. The red color which in the Roman day was the signal of defiance, denotes daring, the blue fidelity and the white purity.

DIPTHERIA .- The New York Tribune says it has received a recipe for the cure of diptheria from a physician who says that of 1,900 cases in which it has been used not a single patient has been lost -The treatment consists in thoroughly swabbing the back of the mouth and throat with a wash made thus : Table salt, 2 drachms; black pepper, golden seal, and save twenty fer cent. on your purchases nitrate of potash, alum, 1 drachm each .-Mix and pulverize, put into a teacup half full of boiling water; stir well, and then fill up with good vinegar. Use every half hour, one, two and four hours, as recovery progresses. The patient may swallow a little each time. Apply one ounce spirits turpentine, sweet oil and aqua amonia mixed, every hour to the whole of the throat, and to the breast bone every four hours, keeping flannel to the part.
