

ODDS & ENDS.

The Navy Department is in receipt of advice from Admiral Porter from Alexandria, La., of March 20th, including some rebel correspondence, which was captured by the gunboat Signal a day or two before, while the rebel mail carrier was crossing the river, giving a complete history of the rebel torpedoes, the machine that blew up the Housatonic, and the manner in which it was done. Admiral Porter says: "They have just appointed a torpedo corps for the purpose of blowing up property of all kinds. The names of the parties are all mentioned in the correspondence, and I used a photograph of one of them."
