EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, May 16, 1864, trains on this road will run as follows:

LEAVE EBENSBURG—At 7.00 A. M., connecting with Balt. Express West and Thro' Accom East. At 6.40 P. M., connecting with Mail Train and Fast Line West and Ex. East.

LEAVE CRESSON—At 10.45 A. M., or on departure of Thro' Accommodation West. At 9.15 P. M., or on departure of Fast Line West.

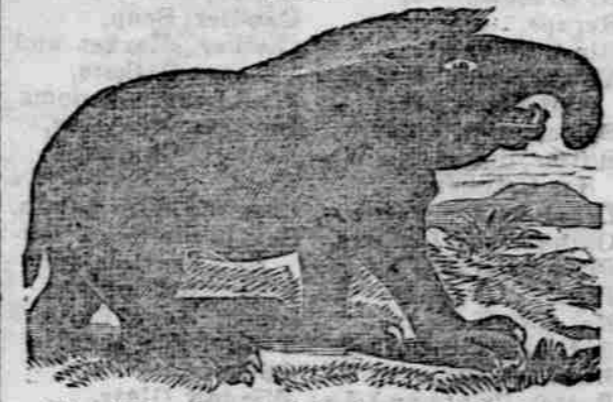
HENRY C. JOHNSTON, Speaker of the House of Representatives. JOHN P. PENNEY, Speaker of the Senate.

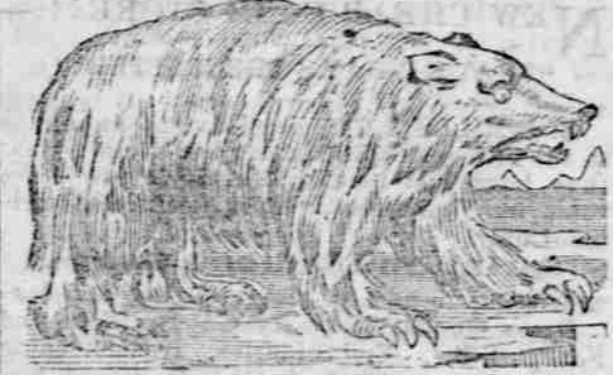

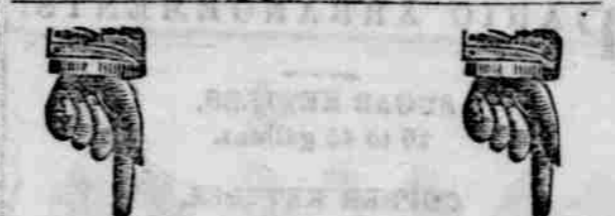
