A Boorish Tailor .- Andy Johnson the Union nominee for Vice President, confesses to the goose and needle, and stands up for his craft, and proudly main tains the honorableness of handicraft labor. He said in a speech in Indiana: "I hold in my-hands, from which I wish to read an extract or two for the benefit of some old Democrats, and young ones, too, a letter written by General Jackson himself, in his own handwriting; and in handling this relie, my mind goes back to the times of 1812. When it was written and published I was a young man, or boy, at work in my shop, and heard it read. And this memory of being in my shop calls to mind what was said when Mr. Lincoln was first nominated. He was called the rail-splitter, and I saw to day you were making good use of the idea; while the Butternut party was being split to pieces, you said the recent nominations were made at Baltimore, the tory papers of the country said: 'They have a rail-splitter and a buffoon for the head of the ticket, and upon the tail they have a boorish tailor.' The idea at the bottom of all this opposition is, that the man who rises up from the mass of the people, the man who advocates the doctrine that man is capable of self-government, has virtue and intelligence to govern himself, should be repudisted. I have nothing to regret of my early life being spent in the shop. never boast of it in my canvasses, but when it is brought up as a reproach, I have met it in the way it should be met, and he who fights with such weapons is not entitled to the respect of anybody .-Yes, the 'boorish tailor' is put upon the tail of the ticket. What an insult to the aristocracy, who want reputation without worth. Yes, I am a tailor, but I learned long since, that if a man does not disgrace his profession, it never disgraces him .-[Cheers.] And I may be permitted to say, that when I was a tailor, I made some pretty close fits. [Laughter.] My garments used to be right well proportioned; but I have seen tailors, at their own expense, too, make a man out of very scant material. I used to be considered a very good tailor, and got my work done according to promise. [Laughter and cheers.] So much for the 'boorish tailor.' One of the is, and it is Republicanism, too, that men should be rewarded according to merit .-It is worth that makes the man, and the want of it the fellow."

THE HOT-MUTTON-PIE DEMOCRACY .-The following is eminently truthful, as well as witty: "One freezing February morning, a negro hawked mutton pies in a basket around Faneuil Hall Square, roaring out, 'Hot mutton pies! hot mutton pies!' A teamster bought and tried to bite one, but found it frozen as hard as the curb stone. 'What do you call these hot for, you black-and-blue swindler!" yelled the teamster to the shivering pieman. 'Wy-wy-a white man guv 'em to me hot this mornin'!' 'Well, you fool, it didn't take ten minutes to freeze them in that old basket. Why call them hot now?' 'Wy-God bress you, dat's de name ob dem-de name ob dem! If I didn't holler de right name ob dem, nobody wouldn't tetch 'em! You want me to holler freeze pies, I suppose? No, sa! You can't fool me dat way!' Thus it is with the Democratic party. They received from Jefferson and Jackson, as a free gitt, their principles. Those gifts they meanly put up for sale and hawk around in the deadly market of slavery, to freeze up in their shabby old party basket .-They roar out, 'Democratic principles! Democratic principles !'-for sale being understood. And when you pay the price of your vote for them, you find slavery benumbing your fingers, paralyzing your tongue, contracting your heart, and turning your stomach. Ask the swindlers why they call such stuff Democracy, and they blandly tell you that Mr. Jefferson gave them the original article-that they have kept it ever since—that it is just as good as new, only not quite so warm, perhaps-and that you really mustn't quarrel with the pieman, for what he calls it is its name. It you want it more Democratic, you may take it home to your own State and warm it; but in the meantime do not interrupt the sales."


