

CIRCULAR LETTER FROM ARCHBISHOP ALEMANY.—The following letter from Most Rev. Archbishop Alemany was read in all the churches some Sundays ago.—It was addressed to the several pastors: "For the last eighteen hundred years, Catholics have theoretically and practically maintained that the precept, 'Honor thy father and thy mother,' obliges them to be respectfully submissive to authority, both civil and ecclesiastical.

"This forms part of their religion to such a degree that no Catholic conscience, at variance with it, can be at rest, or hope for salvation.

"So firmly does the Catholic adhere to authority, that the great doctor of the Church, St. Augustin, would not yield his belief even to the Holy Scripture, unless this were taught him by authority of the Church.

"In a similar manner, respectful obedience to their Government is enjoined on all Catholics throughout the world, in the catechism of children, in books of devotion, in all theological works, and in all the Canons and Papal Constitutions from St. Peter to Pius IX; and the same will be done till time shall be no more, because God says, 'Let every soul be subject to higher powers'—Rom. 13, 1. This is well known to all Catholics, and with rare exceptions, practised by them everywhere, and at all times. But as it may occasionally happen that some Catholics, as well as others, may in troubled times be misguided, and made to participate in unwarranted agitations, I have therefore deemed it proper to request of you to warn your flock against such deceits and commotions, and to instruct them to continue to join, with their reverential submission to civil authority, their calm, quiet, peaceable and independent conduct.

"Princes may sometimes make war, but private individuals cannot. The company of seditious men can do no other service than to drag the incautious into excesses, quarrels, emities, blows, and not unfrequently into an untimely and unprovided death.

- James H. Wayne, of Georgia, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.
- David Davis, of Illinois, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.
- John Carson, of Tennessee, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.
- Noah H. Swayne, of Ohio, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.
- Samuel F. Miller, of Iowa, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.
- Stephen J. Field, of California, Associate Justice; salary, \$6000.

The Court meets on the first Monday in December of each year, at Washington.—It is now in session.
