

LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

EDENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, May 29th, 1865, trains on this road will run as follows: LEAVE EDENSBURG— At 6.00 A. At 8.50 P. M., or on departure of Phila. Express East.

EDENSBURG.—It is given as a singular combination of facts that Col. Jacob M. Campbell and Lieut.-Col. John P. Linton, the rival candidates for Surveyor General, both reside in Johnstown, both belonged to the same regiment in the service, and both were unsuccessful candidates before their respective district conferences for the nomination for State Senator. We doubt whether two candidates for a State office were ever selected under similar circumstances.... We notice that the farmers here and there throughout the country are yet engaged in harvesting their hay. Mr. B. was Senator from the Jefferson, Forest and Elk district in years gone by, and hence is no new hand at the bellows political. Hence also the "Hon." to his name.... The editor of the Huntingdon Journal & American has hastened to acknowledge to us that he is a "fool." It was unnecessary. Self-evident things need neither demonstration nor acknowledgement.
