DEATH OF LIEUT .- COL. CHARLES MC-ERMITT .- A friend sends us the followg announcement of the death of a former bensburgher. It is cut from a Califoris paper, the name and date of which are ot mentioned :-

"The telegraph brings us the painful ntelligence of the death of Lieut.-Col. Charles McDermitt, of the Second Caliornia Cavalry, commander of the District f Nevada, who fell by the hands of kulking Indian assassins, on Tuesday .-Col. M'Dermitt was one in whose praise, s an officer and a gertleman, too much annot be said. He was born in Cambria ounty, Pennsylvania; served with disinction as a Lieutenant and Captain in he Second Pennsylvania Volunteers in he Mexican War, and came to California in 1849, settling in Siskiyou county, where he held the positions of County Judge and Sheriff at different times .-When the first call was made for Volunteers in California in 1861, he raised a company for the Second Cavalry, and was commissioned Captain by Governor Stanford. He was stationed first, we believe, at Fort Miller, and early in 1862 was promoted to the rank of Major. Early in 1865 he was promoted to the rank of Lieut.-Colonel, and two weeks since was appointed to the important position of Commander of the District of Nevada, by General Orders No. 1, issued by General McDowell on his assuming command of the Department of California. His first promotion caused some ill feeling among other officers of the Second Regiment, who felt offended at his elevation over them; but his conduct in every position fully justified the confidence reposed in him by General Wright, and he had warm and carnest friends among all classes of our citizens. In his relations as an officer he was a model worthy of imitation, and s a citizen, a husband and a father, his remory will be cherished and revered by all who knew him. No man in the Department of the Pacific stood higher in the confidence of the successive commanders under whom he served, and his loss is one which will be felt seriously by the service. He leaves a family at Fort

TRIAL OF DAVID RIDDLE .- We publish on to-day's outside the proceedings in full in the case of the Commonwealth vs. David Riddle, for the murder of Miss Polly Paul. The trial, like that of John Ream on the same charge, resulted in verdict of not guilty from the box. Some singular testimony was educed in the course of the trial, which will be remarked upon a perusal of our report. For inetance: One witness testifies to seeing Riddle in Ebensburg on the 7th Junethe day the murder was committed; one other swears most positively to seeing him at his house, two miles west of Ebensburg, the same day; and yet others swear to seeing him in that vicinity, not many miles from the scene of the murder, on that day. On the other hand, witnesses from Jefferson county testify that Riddle was at home, in that county, eighty miles away from where the witnesses for the prosecution testify to seeing him, on the 7th June-that he was there on the 21st May and on the 22d June, and during all the intervening period! Allowing our readers to reconcile this conflicting testimony to their own liking, we content ourself with saying that one party or the other of the witnesses were most remarkably deceived as to the identity of the man in question.
