EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD.

On and after Monday, October 9, 1865, trains on this road will run as follows:

LEAVE EBENSBURG—

At 6.55 A. M., connecting with Mail Train East, and Erie Ex. West.

At 5.30 P. M., connecting with Mail West and Altoona Accom. East.

LEAVE CRESSON—

At 11.00 A. M., or on departure of Mail Train East.

At 8.40 P. M., or on departure of Mail Train West.

THE MOUNTAIN.—A stranger who sojourned a few weeks in our midst last summer, in quest of health and happiness, has been writing the result of his observations here and hereabout to the Pittsburg Leader.

This town is beautifully located on the crest of the Alleghenies, and it appears to be a model one in its way.
