This safe, containing all my papers and valuable papers belonging to myself and some to my neighbors and representing a value of over Twenty Dollars, (\$20,000) was in my possession on the night of the 22d of July, 1865, and passed through the fiery furnace unscathed. The safe was on the second and fell to the basement of the Mill, and subjected for six hours to an intense heat among the ruins, which was greatly increased by the combustion of a large quantity of confined within the brick walls. After the fire was opened and the house papers taken out in a state of perfect preservation, the paper was seen being blown out by the wind, to many bystanders, a better recommendation of your safe could be expressed in any other words.
