

CHINAMEN AND THEIR WAYS.—A California letter has the following: Queer chaps these Chinamen are, and queer customs they have. In one corner of the room sits my Chinese boy, reading a book upside down, and after the manner of his country, grinning like a chimpanzee over hieroglyphics that look like a bunch of black radishes. He understands it all, though, and probably finds that style of literature very funny. I attended the Chinese dinner which was given to Speaker Colfax, ate with chop-sticks, swallowed a little of each of the hundred and eighty-nine courses that constituted the repast. We sat down at sharp six, and got thro' at one prompt. Yes, I ate broiled bamboo and stewed whalebone—which perhaps may be styled the spring vegetables of the Chinese—sharks' fins, birds' nests, and other delicacies too recuperative to mention. By way of dessert, they have pickled cucumbers and melon seeds, and all manner of sweet things. Taken as a whole, however, I don't think I should like a steady course of Chinese diet, tho' the tea which they gave us was of the most wonderful flavor. It was served up without sugar and milk, and cost \$50 a pound, which is perhaps the reason why they did not ask us to take a second cup. You would have been amused could you have seen each guest making frantic attempts to get something into his mouth with the chop-sticks. Try to eat with knitting-needles, and you will have some idea of the difficulty of the feat. If I were a boarding-house keeper, I think I'd ring them in upon my boarders to use instead of knives and forks. A little hash, with them, would go a wonderful great way. I flanked the difficulty of taking hold of anything with them by sharpening mine-off at the end and harpooning the meat and vegetables.

THE DEAD OF 1865.—The year that has just passed away was too momentous with great events to have its history condensed into a newspaper article. Not the least of its achievements was the bearing away with it into the solemn past of some of the brightest names known among men. First in the illustrious list, as he stands first in the hearts of Americans, is Abraham Lincoln. With him have gone from our own land, Thomas Corwin, John Brown, Preston King, Jacob Collamer, and Edward Everett, while we mourn with England at the loss of Richard Cobden and Lord Palmerston. Science has been robbed of Valentine Mott, the greatest surgeon of his time, Encke, the Prussian astronomer, Paxton the English inventor, Ollendorf, the great grammarian, and others. Literature mourns Worcester, of dictionary fame, Mrs. Gaskell, Mrs. Sigourney and Richard Hildreth. From the ranks of the nobility have fallen King Leopold the Duke of Northumberland, the Russian Czarovich and Joseph Bonaparte. Of women noted through themselves or their relations to others, have been the wife of Secretary Seward, the wife of Louis Kossuth, the widow of the poet Moore, the widow of Aaron Burr, and the mother of Thackeray. A vast additional number, of greater or less renown, have followed these in their march to the tomb and to eternity.

MR. SEWARD'S FIRST KNOWLEDGE OF THE DEATH OF LINCOLN.—Mr. Seward had been kept in ignorance of the attack on the President, his physician fearing that the shock would be too great for him to bear, and all newspapers were rigidly excluded from his room. On the Sunday following his assassination, the Secretary had the bed wheeled around so that he could see the tops of the trees in the park opposite, just putting on the spring foibles, when his eyes caught the stars and stripes at half mast on the War Department, on which he gazed awhile, then turning to his attendant said: "The President is dead." The confused attendant stammered and changed color as he tried to say nay, but the sagacious old man said: "If he had been alive he would have been the first to call on me; but he has not been here, nor has he sent to know how I am, and there's the flag at half mast." The old statesman's inductive reason had told the truth, and he lay in silence, the great tears coursing down his gashed cheeks, as the dreadful truth sank into his mind.
