Meeting of the Union Co. Committee.

The Union County Committee of Cambria county met pursuant to call at the "Mountain House," Ebensburg, on Saturday afternoon, 10th instant. A very full attendance was present.

On the second ballot, Major James D. Hamilton, of Wilmore, was elected Representative Delegate to the 7th of March State Convention, with instructions to support Gen. Harry White, State Senator from this district, as the choice of Cambria county for Governor.

Messrs. Wm. M. Jones, of Ebensburg, Dr. Bell, of Summit, and S. L. Evans, of Carrolltown, were appointed Senatorial Conferees to meet like Conferees from Indiana and Jefferson counties, to select a Senatorial Delegate to the State Convention.

We notice that the Indiana County Committee met on the 12th instant, and that the Jefferson County Committee is called to meet on the 15th. The last of the Senatorial Conferees will therefore be appointed to-day. No arrangement having been made for fixing the time or place of meeting of the Conference, we would suggest Thursday, March 1st, as the time, and Indianaboro as the place.

How would this suit our friends in Indiana and Jefferson counties?

The nomination of Gen. Harry White for Governor by our Committee, is a most fitting compliment to a good, true man, and shows the exact measure of esteem in which he is held here at home. With him as our standard-bearer, and with the prestige which attaches to his name, both as a statesman and a warrior, working and to work in our behalf, we could carry the State by 50,000 majority. We commend his name to the most favorable consideration of the State Convention.

BUSER AND HOUSER.—We surrender a large portion of our available space this week to the charge of his Honor Judge Taylor in the case of the Commonwealth vs. Buser and Houser, tried and convicted in our county Court of murder. The document interferes somewhat with our usual variety of reading matter; still, in view of the wide spread interest which the case has excited and is exciting, we feel confident we could fill our columns with nothing which would give greater satisfaction to a majority of our readers. The charge, like all documents of the sort which emanate from the pen of his Honor, will be found to be a calm, careful and searching review of all the evidence in the case, with a clear application of the law to the facts as developed in the evidence.

In this connection, we may mention that the Pittsburgh Dispatch still contends that the death-warrants of the two unfortunate men have been signed by Governor Curtin. We are informed by one who knows whereof he speaks that this is not the fact, and that the warrants will not be signed until after the writ of error granted in the case has been argued before the Supreme Court. The writ will be argued to-day, in Philadelphia.

STOLE AN OVERCOAT.—We learn from the Hollidaysburg Register that on Monday of last week, an individual named Valentine was arrested in Altoona, charged with stealing an overcoat, and was committed to the Blair county jail. It appears that the theft took place in Cambria county, though the stolen property was found in the possession of the prisoner in Blair county. According to the ruling of Judge Taylor in a similar case, the fellow will have to be tried in Cambria county.

BRUHAN, Feb. 12, 1866. To the Editor of The Alleghenian: I saw by your paper of last week, that the Union County Committee of Cambria county was called to meet at the Court House, Ebensburg, on Saturday, 10th instant, to nominate a Representative Delegate to the State Convention, &c., &c.

Being a strong Union man myself, I concluded to hitch up my sled and go to town, to see what was done, &c., &c. Arrived in town, I went straightway to the Court House, at which place the Committee was called to meet. To my surprise, I found the Court House tenanted and alone. A bystander told me that no member having been found who was willing of himself to kindle a fire in the Court-room, the Committee had concluded to convene in the parlor of the "Mountain House," where a fire was already burning, &c., &c.

I at once repaired to the "Mountain House," rejoiced at the possibility of my being able to come in at or near the death, &c., &c. But I was disappointed. At the "Mountain House," I was informed that, owing to the pressing exigencies of the situation, it had been thought expedient, to the end of allowing no possible disturbance of the peace and harmony of the convolve through the interference of "outsiders," that the door of the parlor should close only behind members of the Committee. I have since learned that the Committee instructed the delegate to the State Convention to vote for Harry White for Governor. I am glad to hear this, for I am a White man. Still, how the Committee was able to know that White was my choice, and John Doe's choice, and Richard Smith's choice, and the choice of all of us, or the majority of us, is more than I can fathom, and so-forth.
