

EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. After Monday, April 16th, 1866, on this road will run as follows:

EBENSBURG.—Notwithstanding the extremely cold weather of the past couple of days, we are assured by those who have been the subject their attention that the crop of this section, excepting possibly cherries, is uninjured by frost.

A lodge was organized at Tunnel Cambria county, a few days ago. It is estimated that a company of those who wear green will forthwith be raised there in the field. What field? The prospect for carrying the mails between Ebensburg post office and the railroad depot was awarded to Mr. Wm. T. Davis Saturday last. He receives \$148 per year for the service. Base ball is becoming immensely popular in this country, and is destined to take rank as our great national game, just as cricket is the national game of England.

We notice that ball clubs have been formed in Allegheny, Hollidaysburg, and Johnstown. Do not form one here? A new Masonic hall was dedicated in Huntingdon on Wednesday last. Sportsmen should bear in mind that it is contrary to law to kill birds, swallows, robins, or any other migratory birds. A penalty of five dollars can be adjudged for each violation.

Samuel Ray, convicted at the March term of the Indiana county Court for forcible entry, and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary, has been pardoned by the Governor. A man named Hildner, residing in Brushvalley township, Indiana county, committed suicide hanging on the 26th ult. This is the case of suicide occurring in Indiana county within the past three months.

A fire conflagration occurred in Allegheny on Thursday night last, which destroyed about two-thirds of the block bounded by Virginia st. to Allegheny street. The total loss is set down at \$30,000, which there is an insurance of \$19,000.

The fire is supposed to have been work of an incendiary. A little son of Lightner Paneko was drowned in Allegheny on the 1st inst. The people of Allegheny county have decided to hold an agricultural fair next fall. The annual fair of the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society will be held at Easton on the 25th, 26th, 27th and 28th days of September.

THE PRESS IN EBENSBURG.—A paper called the Mountain Telegraph was printed about 1827 or 1828. We were under the impression that the Telegraph was established till later, but are assured it had existence during the interval between the suspension of the Cambria and the commencement of the Alleghanian. So that, the Telegraph was the first paper printed in Ebensburg, and the first of the fourth.

The Telegraph was short lived. It was conducted by Messrs. R. & S. Young, the names of whom died during the period of publication. R. Young was elected a delegate from Cambria county to the Convention to revise the Constitution of Pennsylvania, which met in Philadelphia on the 2d, 1837. He removed westward, and died.

On June 22, 1832, a paper called the Cambria Democrat was established here, and Arnold Downing. It was published for the term of one year, contemporaneous with the Sky. Mr. Downing was the proprietor for the erection of the present Court House of Cambria county.

The Democrat establishment was sold in Allegheny, and we believe, was removed to Johnstown. The press and type were brought back here afterward, however, in 1837 were made the agency thro' Downing, who was born into an admiring world of this Mountaineer, after undergoing various variations as to name and ages as to editors, has come down to the present day in the form of the Democrat & Sentinel. Downing also went westward and died.

THE INCOME TAX.—As no postponement has been made in the time prescribed for making income assessments, and no amendment to the Internal Revenue act has been passed by Congress, the Commissioner of Internal Revenue has issued instructions directing Assessors to enter at once upon the assessment of incomes, licenses, watches, carriages, silver plate, and billiard tables, and their especial attention is called to the importance of making the assessment thorough and prompt.

All persons liable, therefore, are advised to furnish their schedules to the Assistant Assessors in their respective districts immediately.

Assistant Assessors are required to complete and deliver their lists to the Assessor within thirty days after the 1st of May; in order to do this, they will be compelled to spend much less time than has heretofore been demanded of them in assisting individuals in making up their returns. The Assessor is under no legal obligation to send blank forms; it is the business of the taxpayer to find his office and obtain the blanks, and then fill them up and return them. In case of neglect or refusal, the Assessor is empowered to make the return and to add a penalty of twenty-five per cent., or, in case of fraud, to add one hundred per cent. to the amount ascertained to be due.

It should be remembered by persons making income returns, that income from all sources must be included. Full credit, however, will be given for all national, state, county, and municipal taxes paid within the year, and the law provides that a deduction of \$600 shall be made from the aggregate income of all the members of any family, composed of parents and minor children or husband and wife. The amount paid for rent, or the rental value, of any homestead occupied by the taxpayer or family, and the amount paid for usual or ordinary repairs, shall also be deducted from the gross income.

The income must be reckoned for the year ending December 31, 1865. The tax is five per cent. on all sums between \$600 and \$5,000, and ten per cent. on the excess over \$5,000.

SHARP PRACTICE.—Some eight or ten days ago, a nameless stranger made his appearance at Cresson, not as a "summer visitor" at the Mountain House, but as a pretended dealer in lumber. He entered into negotiations looking to the purchase of large quantities of lumber, and did a flourishing business—on paper. On Tuesday of last week, he visited the Summit, and there succeeded in disposing of a check for \$75 on the Johnstown Bank to a Mr. Hughes, receiving cash for the same. The check was forwarded to Bank for payment, but was returned shortly, with the endorsement across its fair face of "forgery! Meantime, the gentleman whose specialty was lumber had "gone up the road"—probably to buy more lumber. He has not since returned, and his numerous friends at and around Cresson, tho' loth to lose him, have come to the unanimous conclusion that the place which a short time ago knew him so intimately, will know him no more forever.

SAD ACCIDENT.—One day last week, the boiler of the steam engine in the saw-mill of Messrs. William James and Morris J. Evans, Elk county, (both formerly of Ebensburg,) exploded. The accident occurred at noon, when all hands connected with the mill except the fireman were at dinner. The fireman was attending to his duties as usual, and was killed outright. His body was blown into the top of a high tree, where it lodged, and was only recovered by felling the tree to the ground.

FIRE.—The dwelling house of Mathias Farabaugh, a short distance west of Munster, on the line of the Eb. & Cresson Railroad, was burned to the ground, with its contents, on Sunday week. The entire family were in attendance at church at the time of the occurrence of the disaster.

The dwelling house of Mr. Landis, in Washington township, was destroyed by fire on Tuesday of last week.

OUR JOHNSTOWN LETTER.

BUDGET OF NEWS FROM THE SOUTH OF THE COUNTY.

JOHNSTOWN, May 7, 1866.

Dear Alleg.: A melancholy case of suicide occurred here on Friday. Capt. John D. Gontz, well known to many of your readers as an officer in a cavalry company during the war, ended his life by swallowing the contents of an ounce vial of laudanum. He lived some three hours after taking the fatal draught. No cause is assigned for the commission of the rash act.

The usual number of arrests by the police were made during the past week.—One man was "taken up" for trundling a wheelbarrow on the pavement, two others for attacking Judge Test, the mail carrier, and another on a charge of attempted burglary.

The schools of Conemaugh boro. open to-day, with S. B. McCormick, T. J. Chapman, Kate Young and Mary Griffin as teachers.

A base ball club has been organized here. A meeting was held on Saturday evening to elect officers, &c.

The Johnstown Democrat made its appearance last week, considerably enlarged. The press is looking up here! D. D.

THE DEMOCRACY OF CAMBRIA COUNTY.—Dear Alleghanian: A word as to the political situation viewed from a Democratic standpoint. Considerable difficulty is experienced in fixing up an acceptable "slate" of nominations for county offices. It is for that reason that the call for a Co. Convention is so long withheld. The slate, when fixed, will be found, as usual, to preponderate largely in favor of Ebensburg and Johnstown. For Congress, R. L. Johnston, of Ebensburg, will probably walk over the course unopposed. For Assembly, C. L. Pershing, of Johnstown, John S. Rhey, of Ebensburg, John Fenlon, of Ebensburg, and E. R. Dunnegan, of Clearfield township, are candidates.—The two first named are the strongest. Fenlon can only hope to come in as a "compromise" resort. Dunnegan, though a very good man, unfortunately for himself does not live in Ebensburg or Johnstown, and so is doomed from the start. My own opinion is that Pershing will make the nomination. He has the prestige in his favor of a long career in the Legislature, extending down to the late session, and, having done all that was asked of him by his party, it will be a difficult matter to convince the rank and file that he ought to be thrown overboard.—For Register and Recorder, James Griffin, of Johnstown, the present incumbent, and George W. Oatman, of Ebensburg, are the prominent candidates. In conformity with an understanding existing between Johnstown and Ebensburg, if Pershing is nominated for Assembly, the Register and Recorder will be conceded to Ebensburg, and Oatman will be nominated. But should Rhey make the landing for Assembly, then Johnstown will get the Register and Recorder, and Griffin will be the man. For Associate Judges, (two,) G. W. Easley, of Johnstown, and H. C. Devine, of Ebensburg, the present incumbents, and Reese J. Lloyd and M. Haddon, both of Ebensburg, are candidates. It is claimed that Easley has a sure thing of the nomination, while the chances are thought to be about even between the others. The minor offices will be parceled out among the mass of hungry blowers and strikers from the rural districts.—Such, just now, appears to be the Democratic situation. OBSERVER.
