OUR JOHNSTOWN LETTER. DULLNESS IN THE NEWS MARKET—ACCIDENT—SICKNESS AND HEALTH—VARIETY. JOHNSTOWN, May 21, 1866. News of a local character calculated to interest the general reader is scarce here. About the usual number of police items might be deflated, but these are becoming so intimately connected with our every-day history as to be scarcely worthy special mention. From the number of persons returned for violation of liquor and license laws, I would anticipate a large amount of business in the Quarter Sessions at the approaching term of our Court. There are also a goodly number of misdemeanors to be disposed of, such as assault, assault and battery, &c. Mr. Maurice Lewis had a narrow escape from sudden death the other day. He was engaged with a number of hands in removing a huge rock of several tons weight from the mouth of a drift in one of the mines of the Company, and while in a stooping posture the heavy stone suddenly and unexpectedly fell, striking him in the small of the back and injuring him severely. During last week, cholera morbus, or some disease akin thereto, prevailed to an alarming extent here. Too much care cannot be taken at this season of the year to ward off such attacks, and the man who, through persistent disregard of the rules of health, prepares his system for disease, is criminally guilty of courting self-destruction. Everybody is complaining of the drouth and praying for rain. The streets are almost constantly enveloped in a cloud of dust, which makes it anything but pleasant for pedestrians. Edward Glass is the retiring Commissioner. I do not know whether he desires re-election or not; if he does, the Dems. might go further after a candidate and fare worse. The various aspirants are busy making metaphorical hay while the sun shines.—They all travel with their pockets crammed with bon-bons for the children, I notice, and dispense cigars to the menfolk and smiles to the women-folk with lavish munificence. With regard to the matter of bon-bons, Harry Devine has the mercantile advantage over his competitors of procuring the toothsome morsels at "first cost," while the same can be said of Reese Lloyd with regard to cigars. But the persuasive power of a smile for electioneering purposes is most potent, and not unfrequently outweighs all considerations connected with bon-bons and cigars.
