**EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD.**  
After Monday, May 21, 1886, trains on this road will run as follows:

**DAY EXPRESS.**  
Leave Ebensburg, connecting with Day Exp. East and Balt. Exp. West.  
Leave Philadelphia, connecting with Phila. Exp. East and Day Exp. West.

**DAY EXPRESS.**  
Leave Philadelphia, on departure of Balt. Exp. West.  
Leave Ebensburg, on departure of Phila. Exp. East.

**THE PRESS IN EBENSBURG.**—July 15, 1862, a new paper was established in Ebensburg, under the name, style and title of *The Mountain Democrat*. As its title would indicate, it was Democratic in politics. It was edited and published by Richard White and Henry C. Devine.

On March 4, 1853, Wm. B. Sipes became partner in the concern. March 21, 1853, Mr. Devine retired, leaving White and Sipes as constituting the firm. The publication of the *Democrat* was continued for these auspices for about five months, when White and Sipes purchased the *Mountain Sentinel* establishment from Richard White, and merged the two offices—*Democrat* and the *Sentinel*—into one.

The first fruits of this union made its appearance on the 26th day of August, 1853, and the branding was named the *Democrat & Sentinel*. Shortly after this, former townsman, John C. O'Neil, was appointed Consul to Belfast by President Pierce. On the 9th December, 1853, Mr. Sipes resigned his position as editor of the *Dem. & Sent.* to enable him to accept the proffered honor of Private Secretary to Consul O'Neil, when Mr. Devine again became associated with White in the publication of the paper.

On May 13, 1857, Mr. White retired, and Mr. Devine became sole editor and publisher. Sept. 2, 1857, C. D. Murray became associate editor. February 17, 1858, Mr. Devine retired, and Mr. Murray became sole editor. The latter intended to edit the paper, with signal success, till the time of his death, which occurred June 16, 1862. Upon the death of Mr. Murray, James S. Todd, at that time publisher of the paper, became editor. He continued to hold that position till April 21, 1864, when he retired and was succeeded by Michael Devine. Mr. H. edited the paper till the 14th, 1865, when Clark Wilson, its present editor and publisher, displaced him. The *Dem. & Sent.* is and always has been the advertising organ of the Democratic office-holders of Cambria county and owes its maintenance mainly to this circumstance. On several occasions, it has nearly been under, but a timely application of "county printing" has proved all-potent to invest it with new lease of life. It is a rare old relic, the *Dem. & Sent.*, binding the past to the present by enduring links of pleasant recollection. May it long be preserved.

Of those heretofore named in connection with the press, some personal mention is not prove uninteresting. Richard White served throughout the war, first as a member of the 10th P. V., and afterwards as a member of the 55th P. V. He died in Philadelphia, Pa., on the 14th April, 1865, after about 40 years. Henry C. Devine was in Ebensburg, and is one of the Associate Judges for Cambria county.—Wm. B. Sipes served throughout the war as a member of the 7th P. Cavalry, and is now living in Philadelphia. Jack Devine is at present living in Luzerne county. C. D. Murray came to his death falling into an uncovered cellar-way on a dark night. As before stated, he died June 16, 1862, aged 30 years. James S. Todd died January 5, 1866, aged 32 years. M. Hasson resides in Ebensburg.

**SCHOOLS FOR SOLDIERS' ORPHANS.**  
Thomas H. Burrows, Supt. Soldiers' Orphans, has issued the following circular: The number of applicants from the western part of the State is now increasing so rapidly that additional schools for their accommodation must be provided. The undersigned will therefore attend at the Alleghenian House, Pittsburgh, on Tuesday, June 29th, 1886, to confer with principals of academies or seminaries, who are willing to devote their property and funds to this purpose. Present accommodations for not less than 75 pupils of both sexes, and from 10 to 16 years of age, are provided in each case, with an understanding that, as soon as practicable, so as to accommodate 150 pupils, with not less than 20 acres of arable land and the necessary buildings, etc., for farming and gardening, attached to each.

Such a school is desirable in the district composed of Erie, Warren, Venango and Westmoreland counties. In the district composed of Fayette, Washington, Allegheny and Westmoreland counties. **THE POLITICAL SITUATION.**—Dear *Alleghenian*: I am happy to inform you that Johnstown has acted on my suggestion that she should increase her number of candidates for Associate Judge to something like the figure enjoyed by Ebensburg. I now learn that a gentleman whom 'twere William Flattery to call the Coroner of Cambria co., residing in Kicknapauling, (which means Johnstown,) has consented to become a candidate for that office, not that he is ambitious of honor or emolument, but simply and only that his native place may not be outnumbered in the count of aspirants before the Convention. The names of the candidates for Judge, so far as heard from, are as follows: H. C. Devine, Rees J. Lloyd, Dr. Storm, Capt. Murray, and Michael Hasson, of Ebensburg, and G. W. Easley, Major Flanagan, and Coroner Flattery, of Johnstown. 'Squire M'Gough, of No. 2, has come out for Register and Recorder. He writes an excellent hand.

**ETCHINGS.**—A son of Mr. Evans, the landlord of the Marker Hotel in Blairsville, attempted to commit suicide in his father's house a few days ago. He was cut down before the vital spark had become extinct. A suit, instituted some years ago by Mrs. Henderson, widow of Mr. Jos. Henderson, of Indiana, against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, has been decided in her favor by the Supreme Court. It will be remembered that the suit was brought for damages for the death of her husband, who was killed at Blairsville Intersection. She was awarded \$3,500. The "dry spell" met its death on Sunday last at the hands of a rain-storm, which has continued to drop blessings upon us, at intervals, ever since.—Vegetation has thus been revived, while the tremendous fires which had theretofore been raging in the woods were completely quenched. Court commences next Monday. The Ashtola saw-mill, near Johnstown, was totally destroyed by fire not long since. Loss about \$25,000. H. A. M'Pike, Esq., has returned to Johnstown from Altoona, and has gone into the mercantile business.
