OUR JOHNSTOWN LETTER.
THE PUDDLERS' STRIKE, AND HOW IT IS PRO-
GRESSING—SUN-STROKE—RUN OFF—A STABLE
BURNED—POLICE, &c., &c.
JOHNSTOWN, July 16, 1866.
Dear Alleg: The strike of the puddlers
and the sweltering heat of the weather
have almost completely paralyzed business
of all kinds in Johnstown during the past
two weeks. How long matters may thus
remain, we do not pretend to decide; but
this is a fact, that, notwithstanding the
assertion that the "puddlers' strike has
virtually ended," large numbers of them
have left town to secure fair remunera-
tion for their labor elsewhere, while the
few furnaces in operation last week were
manned by men some of whom, at least, are
said never to have had a month's experi-
ence in the business. Certain it is that
less than half the old puddlers are at work
to-day.

On Friday, a German woman, whose
name we failed to learn, while working in
her garden, in this borough, fell dead
from sun-stroke.

Saturday, the disposition so often re-
marked during the summer of horses to
run off, was again manifested in the
fragmentary remains of a dilapidated
butcher wagon on Canal street. No
personal injury resulted from the run-off
so far as ascertained.

Saturday night, Cambria Borough was
thrown into consternation by the burning
of a stable immediately below the Catholic
church in that place. The stable was the
property of Mr. Barney Keelan. Fortuna-
tely, the night was calm and the flames
spread no further.

Police business during the week was by
no means dull, but the notice of such
items must be becoming somewhat uninter-
